Message from Dr. Andrew McLaughlin

Dear Catholic School Educators,

As we continue our mission in a new year, I would like to share with you some thoughts from a prayer we recently used at one of our staff meetings:

Dear God, Thank you that you make all things new. Thank you for all that you've allowed into our lives this past year, the good along with the hard things, which have reminded us how much we need you and rely on your presence filling us every single day.

We pray for your Spirit to lead us each step of this New Year. We ask that you will guide our decisions and turn our hearts to deeply desire you above all else. We ask that you will open doors needing to be opened and close the ones needing to be shut tight. We ask that you would help us release our grip on the things to which you've said "no," "not yet," or "wait." We ask for help to pursue you first, above every dream and desire you've put within our hearts. We ask for your wisdom, for your strength and power to be constantly present within us. We pray you would make us strong and courageous for the road ahead. ... that You would whisper in our ear when we need to run and whisper in our heart when we need to stand our ground.

Calling to Family Community and Participation

The person is not only sacred but also social. How we organize our society—in economics and politics, in law and policy—directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community.

Marriage and the family are the central social institutions that must be supported and strengthened, not undermined. We believe people have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable.

"The family is thus an agent of pastoral activity through its explicit proclamation of the Gospel and its legacy of varied forms of witness, namely solidarity with the poor, openness to a diversity of people, the protection of creation, moral and material solidarity with other families, including those most in need, commitment to the promotion of the common good and the transformation of unjust social structures, beginning in the territory in which the family lives, through the practice of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy." EXTENDED: Secretary Grant Registration Open Until January 31

WE HAVE EXTENDED OUR APPLICATION PERIOD TO JANUARY 31

The Office of Catholic Elementary (OCE) is proud to provide the Secretary Grant as a resource to support our elementary school teachers who have children that attend an Archdiocesan elementary school. Please note the list below for guidelines and qualifications:

- One parent/guardian must be employed full-time as an Archdiocesan elementary and/or early childhood school teacher <u>at the time of</u>
 <u>submission of the application</u> and continue to be employed in the 2022-2023 school year.
- The child/children must attend an Archdiocesan elementary (not early childhood) school in the 2022-2023 school year.
- The teacher must have been employed at an Archdiocesan school in the 2021-2022 school year.
- The grant is applied toward elementary school tuition.
- The grant is based on the number of applicants and the calculated need of each applicant, so award amounts may vary.
- The application process is a two-part process, as follows:
- 1. Completion of the <u>Secretary Grant Application</u>. (*This will determine the eligibility of the applicant*.)

2. Completion of the <u>FACTS application</u> | <u>1-866-444-4637</u>. (*This will determine the amount of the scholarship*.)

Please retain a copy of your confirmation for each application filed.

 The deadline for submitting the application January 31, 2021. No applications will be accepted after this point. OCE is working to streamline the Secretary Grant process, as we understand that it has been confusing in the past. Christian Unity in 2022

The theme for the Week of Prayer for <u>Christian Unity</u> in 2022, which comes from the second chapter of Matthew's Gospel, is the Epiphany.

From the Shrine of the Immaculate Medal.


