
excited to help provide a vision and leadership to grow enrollment in the diocesan elementary schools.

# **Handwriting is Essential**



Handwriting instruction is still essential at **every** level from pre-K through grade 8. It has never been eliminated from the Archdiocesan curriculum. Formal instruction using manuscript letters should begin at the PK level. Instruction in cursive writing should begin mid-year in the second grade with continued instruction and practice throughout the grades. The following points should be considered:

• The use of larger pencils and crayons at the primary levels is not recommended by handwriting experts. Students at this level should be using pencils more appropriate to the size of their hands.

- At all levels it is important to instruct students how to correctly hold a pencil.
- Teachers should model good handwriting.
- Students admitted from schools where cursive writing was not taught should be given extra attention in this area until they develop the skill.
- Every class in grades 5-8 should have at least 10 minutes a day to practice handwriting skills.
- Manuscript writing should not be permitted beyond Grade 3. Research indicates that using it slows the learning process.

## **Algebra Testing**

Scantron is no longer producing the Algebra testing that the secondary schools used and which we used for Honors Math programs. Please do not contact Scantron about this testing as we no longer have an affiliation with them.

We are now awaiting for final arrangements to be made with the new provider, Renaissance Stars, and will provide information and training on this program as soon as it is finalized.

<u>Registration</u> for the testing is open on Acceptiva. However, before you register, you must submit your completed Honors Math forms and have the students approved for entrance into the program. Acceptiva registrations that are submitted without this step completed will not be forwarded to Renaissance.

Approved Honors Math programs are the only recognized programs that use grouping for mathematics instruction. Based on research, all other students should be heterogeneously grouped.
