

Honors Math



Criteria for Admission

The criteria for acceptance into the Honors Math Program is being updated to include a score above the 70th percentile for all areas of Math on the Objectives Performance Index of Terra Nova. This score is a greater indicator of Mastery of skills than the National Percentile.

Recognized Programs

We have been receiving concerns addressed by parents about schools advertising Accelerated Math Programs. While we encourage differentiated instruction in the math class, the Honors Math Program and Math Matters Program are the only approved accelerated programs. According to **Policies and Procedures**, "With the exception of honors math students, students are heterogeneously grouped for mathematics instruction." (Section 600)

Algebra Assessments

Our secondary schools were notified in June by Scantron that they would no longer be supporting the Achievement and Performance Series Assessments that are used for Algebra classes. This affected our elementary Honors Algebra classes since our agreement with the high schools to award credit for the Algebra course is contingent on the fact that we are using the same assessment as the Freshman Algebra classes. The process to adopt a new assessment involved research, evaluating programs to determine if they were aligned to our curriculum, drawing up a contract, legal review of the contract, and setting up the program. Unfortunately, we have also run into some issues with our schools reaching out to other providers of the formerly used tests and have been trying to set up assessments without authorization. This caused further delays for us.

A new assessment has been selected and we should be able to start set-up within the next few weeks. For more information on this program follow the link below. We will send additional information as it becomes available.

Fine Arts

As noted in an earlier edition of the Monthly



Messenger, the latest release of *Standards for Fine Arts* address five areas of fine arts music, art, dance, drama and media arts rather than separate standards for art and music. This will precipitate a change in how we address these areas in our classes.

With teacher shortages as we are experiencing them, we might see schools sharing art and music teachers by doing double periods of art /music in one trimester in one school and switching in another trimester. Skills could be combined with drama, dance and media arts to produce a program in the third trimester. This could also be done on an alternating week/month schedule. As for content skills, dance will be incorporated into physical education; media arts applied using technology in all content areas; and drama is appropriately incorporated into ELA.

Standardized Testing



Terra Nova NEXT

The Terra Nova test has been updated to a new edition—Terra Nova NEXT. The following changes will be seen in this newest edition:

- Schools will have the option of doing either online or pencil and paper testing. (All in the school must use the same format
- There is only one format for the testing at all levels, eliminating Complete Battery and Multiple Assessment format.
- There are no Constructed Response questions in this format. The skills formerly tested by the constructed response questions have been incorporated into stronger depth multiple choice questions—sometimes requiring more than one choice to an answer or more than one question related to a topic.

- In order to obtain foundational scores at the primary level for the purpose of accurate longitudinal studies,, Grade 2 will be included in the mandated testing. This will also include the InView testing so that a preliminary CSI score can be obtained.
- Schools will no longer need to purchase pre-printed practice activities as these are available as pdf files at no cost on the online reporting system.

Beacon

If your school participated in the Spring or Fall pilot of the Terra Nova NEXT testing, you have been given free access to the Beacon Benchmark Assessments which are both adaptive and predictive of success in the Terra Nova NEXT. DRC BEACON is designed to be administered multiple times a year, allowing students and educators the opportunity to check for learning throughout the year rather than relying on a single summative test score at the end of the year. This enables educators to monitor student performance throughout the year and to make informed decisions to promote academic growth.

Testing Training Tuesdays

Testing Training Tuesdays will continue in the second trimester with a focus on using the Beacon Assessments and preparing for Terra Nova Next. A schedule will be sent out at the beginning of the trimester.

End of Level Assessments

Performance assessments should be administered in all content areas throughout the school year. These have been included as part of the end-of-level assessments for several years to model for teachers what a quality performance looks like and how it is assessed. **This year we will have only one assessment in each content area at each leve**l. It will incorporate both objective skills and minor performance tasks to be administered at the scheduled time for end of level assessments, allowing for more instructional time during the month of May.
